Join with us at our Coffee Pot on Friday mornings in the Wesley Room from 10.30 until noon for refreshments and chat.

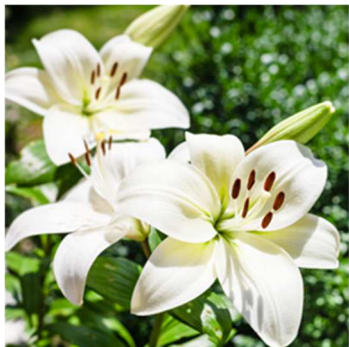
Or at our services at 10.45 on the 1st 3rd or 5th Sundays of each month. You will be very welcome.

Allotments

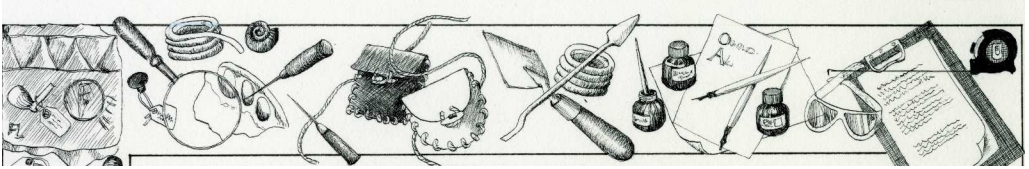
Spring is in the air and what better than to get out in the garden?

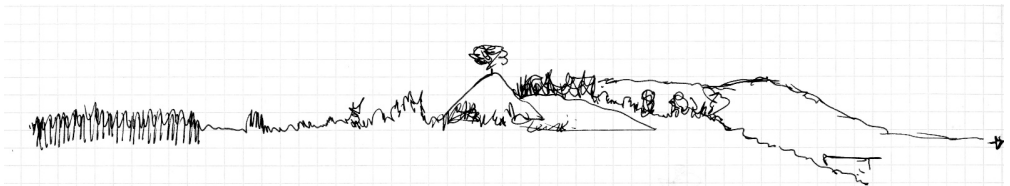

SHOP NEWS: Things you (probably) didn't know about your Post Office

When Kingsbury Shop and Café moved into the new Community Centre building in 2017, opening a post office was one of the top requests from the community. However, when approached, the Post Office initially predicted revenue of only £4-5,000 per year which was deemed to be 'not worthwhile'. After much badgering they relented, and over the years we have far exceeded expectations. Kingsbury's PO revenues for last financial year were over £11,000.

There are many reasons why the post office is a success. Easy parking is a big plus, as is opening 6 days a week from 8.30am to 3pm Monday to Saturday. And of course, the Post Office is part of Kingsbury Community Shop and Café so customers can also pick up fresh food, groceries, a quick lunch or a coffee. Finally, we can't discount the fact that many neighbouring villages have lost their post offices in the past few years including South Petherton and Somerton.

The viability of the PO is based on its volunteer workforce, ably supported by our Assistant Manager and Postmaster Angus Brazier whose time is spread over PO and shop duties. Including back-office work, running the PO takes about 50 hours per week. The team of 9 trained volunteers each work a 3-4 hour shift, which can include opening and closing. Several volunteers also organise rotas and work with Angus on weekly and monthly reports to ensure it all runs smoothly.

All PO volunteers and staff undergo rigorous training, DBS checks and compulsory refresher tests at least four times a year. Yes, we use the infamous *Horizon* operating software, but thankfully it works pretty well these days, and we get good support from the PO help desk when we need it!

Other reasons why Kingsbury Post Office is a success is the range of services we offer. Apart from the usual sale of stamps and postage, customers can pay bills and most importantly, do their banking. Kingsbury PO offers free cash and cheque deposits into most bank accounts as well as free cash withdrawals. Customers going on holiday can also pre-order foreign currency on the PO website and collect it here in Kingsbury. These services have become increasingly important following the demise of high street bank branches. And each time you use your PO to do your banking or send a parcel, we get a small payment – which all adds up!

The rise in online shopping is another reason we are doing well. We provide a regular service to a number of local online businesses and also handle lots of home shopping returns. We don't have a lot of space which can be a bit of a problem at busy times, but we get paid 30p per parcel, 1p for selling a first-class stamp and 0.3p for a second-class stamp.

Despite the good overall performance, PO payments can't be relied upon to generate a living wage so it's not a surprise that many commercial post offices are closing. When we divide our annual remuneration by the time spent by volunteers, the nominal 'hourly rate' for Kingsbury PO workers would be £4.38. This highlights the value of volunteer labour and the whole community shop ideal.

Everyone who is part of the PO team enjoys the challenge and the rewards of making the PO work. We are hugely thankful to all the PO volunteers and to Angus for keeping it going and providing such a great service. (Our overall efficiency rating is 99.8% with only 1 complaint received in the last 24 months.) So, we do hope you appreciate the hard work and goodwill that keeps the PO going and urge you to keep using it. Every transaction helps the shop's bottom line. And if you are interested in joining us, do get in touch. We are always on the lookout for new volunteers.

Kingsbury Wildlife Group

During March and April the Caterpillars and Butterflies need your help as: the first fresh shoots really start to sprout from perennial plants. Allow fallen leaves to remain on the flower beds for winter, but in spring the plants will start to need more light. So, to help them, just move the leaves off the growing plants, piling them up around the sides of the plants or tucking them under the growing leaves. This makes sure that the **caterpillars** and pupae of **butterflies** tucked up in the leaves aren't disturbed too much, while the plants have access to the light they need.



To continue with this theme, could you consider planting a **Sunflower**? A single Sunflower can support dozens of bee species, provide seeds for birds and attract Butterflies all through the summer season.

Big Garden Birdwatch – January '25

The following were seen in gardens in the village. What did **you** see?

Greenfinches, Sparrows, Great tits, Blue tits, Robins, Blackbirds, Wren, Blackcaps, Greater Spotted Woodpeckers, Dunnocks, Goldfinches, Chaffinches, Tawny owl (heard), Wood pigeon, Long tailed tits, Song Thrushes.

Also around the village, the following were seen – Barn Owl, Little Egrets, Cormorants, Kingfisher, Fieldfares, Great White Egrets, Golden Plover, Pied Wagtail, Stonechats, Heron, Marsh Harrier, Swans, Canada Geese, Teal, Widgeon, Shelduck, Lapwing, Cranes (heard), Kestrel.

May Festival – 5th May, 2025

We'll be at the May Festival and the theme is Insects. We'll have an insect trail for children to take part in and information about wildlife in the village - How to make a bucket pond, etc, to attract insects.

If you have any spare wildlife-friendly plants from propagation or dividing, you can bring them to the stall or deliver them to either Lynda Hollis at Gawbridge Mill or Paula Hunt, Highlands, Owl St, East Lambrook. Thank you!

Summary of the January Parish Council Meeting

The council set its budget and precept for the upcoming financial year, considering routine functions and the ongoing challenges with the finances of Somerset Council. Within the budget, the council is pleased to be able to support each local voluntary organisation who had applied for funding support during 2025/26.
